# STIGMA 101

Anyone and everyone can be affected

STEPS TO REDUCE STIGMA

Talk openly about mental health.

Educate yourself and others.

Be conscious of language.

Encourage equality between physical, mental illness, and SUD.

Show compassion for those with mental health and substance use challenges.

Choose empowerment over shame.

Be honest about treatment.

Let The media know when they're being stigmatizing.

Don't harbor self-stigma.



I felt hopeless, like no one cared. People judged me and I was battling alone.



Much of what many people have learned about Substance Use Disorder (SUD) and mental health has come from pop-culture.

The emotional impact of stigma

So many carry with them the weight of guilt, every moment of their daily lives.

The personal shame of the missed and squandered opportunities, poor and nonexistent familial connections due to their substance misuse or mental ailment.

It is akin to ripping off a scab every time someone faces mistreatment and bias because of their disease, and is a constant reminder of their perceived shortcomings.

Addressing stigma in healthcare environments and among healthcare providers

View people as the human beings we are.

Understand that these are diseases and as such, we're in the business of disease elimination and eradication... however that may look with the demographic we're working with.

Do a self- assessment to find out if you're in the right field and if you are, we must be reminded that we are servants of those who need us.

Stigma is being judgemental. Plain. Simple.



VA, DoD guidelines recommend buprenorphine for chronic pain, not full agonist opioids

VA, DoD guidelines recommend buprenorphine for chronic pain, not full agonist opioids. Buprenorphine may be used for patients taking daily opioid analgesics for chronic pain, according to new guidelines from the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the Department of Defense (DoD). Buprenorphine's lower risk of misuse or overdose compared with full agonist opioids make it a safe option, according to the guidelines. "The benefits that opioids can provide are small and are outweighed by the risks to the patient," wrote authors of guidelines in the Annals of Internal Medicine. "If the decision is made to use longterm opioid therapy for a patient, then buprenorphine should be considered because of its lower risk profile."



Proposed rule open for comment: Medications for the Treatment of Opioid Use Disorder: Removal of the DATA-2000 Waiver Requirements

The Department of Health and Human Services is issuing a supplemental notice of proposed rulemaking to solicit public comment on its proposal to remove provisions authorized under the Controlled Substances Act (CSA), as amended by the Drug Addiction Treatment Act of 2000 (DATA-2000). These changes result from amendments made in the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023, which was enacted on December 29, 2022, Section 1262(a)(1) of the Act amended the CSA by eliminating the requirement that practitioners obtain a waiver to prescribe certain schedule III-V medications for the treatment of opioid use disorder (OUD). The deadline for comments is March 14, 2023,



USDA Launches Rural Data Gateway to Strengthen Partnerships and Expand Access to Resources for People in Rural America

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development Under Secretary Xochitl Torres Small today unveiled the Rural Data Gateway, a new resource to make the Department's data for rural projects easier to access for its partners and for people living in rural communities. The Rural Data Gateway will help USDA better target resources to the people who need them most in rural places. It also will help the Department be a stronger partner to rural people, entrepreneurs, government officials and other stakeholders. "The Biden-Harris Administration knows that transparency is important for a free government," Torres Small said. "It also drives innovation, accountability and more equitable outcomes for rural people everywhere."

YST TOR shared the following innovative activities and their successful outcomes:

Through our new community arts programming, we hosted a family vision board night. At this event, we had several lhanktonwan families come to our office to engage in the art activity. The facilitator provided materials and instruction. Parents and caregivers guided children through the activity. The participants shared in our closing talking circle that they were able to tune into their child's needs and creativity. They had fun making artwork and expressed a desire to do more. We combined therapeutic arts with our Dakota cultural teachings which had a positive impact on the families.

Art Kits for Kids







In collaboration with our lead artist, we created art kits for families with children in elementary school and younger. The kits come with a variety of art and crafts tools. Every month we offer new kits and the activity instructions are tailored to Dakota cultural teachings of family respect, honesty, and gratitude. Below are pictures that parents sent in from the February kits. Parents commented that their children were engaged in artmaking and had fun making new projects. The parents shared it was good to have uninterrupted art time with their children.

Ongoing Youth Groups Prevention





We host youth group activities a few times a week with a group of junior high students. These students have shared that they like coming to our office to learn new skills and have a place to stay after school. So far, the students have created artwork, one art task was to sketch their favorite superheroes. Their next project is to draw themselves as a Superhero. With this activity, students are guided to highlight their personal strengths. In our groups, we combine lessons from the American Indian Life Skills Curriculum with artmaking. Our TOR team is so thankful to work with these bright students!
