Tamera Ford, LCSW, an expert in trauma-informed care, provided insight into the fundamentals of trauma. Topics of discussion included:

- · Definitions and categories of trauma

- · Descriptions of human arousal states and what they mean
- · Responding to trauma in self and others, both in the community and in the workplace

What do you feel is the most important impact of your work?

At the TROI Resource Center, we provide resources to community members about the science of addiction and harm reduction principles. When we meet people where they are, we can connect and learn from each other. Giving a voice to people with lived experience with addiction and their powerful recovery narratives has been both humbling and inspirational. I feel like one of the most important impacts of our work is the changing of attitudes towards people who are working through the difficult journey of recovery. Through the sharing of personal recovery narratives, understanding and compassion are increased and lives are saved. The TROI Resource Center is committed to reduce stigma surrounding harm reduction and SUD. The Center provides holistic wellness programs that promote healthier Utah rural and tribal communities.

TROI uses a community-based, participatory-action approach to creating local change around OUD treatment and recovery. Programs include:

- Culturally humble naloxone trainings available for inperson and virtual delivery.
- An annual rural opioid and stimulant wellness summit, featuring harm reduction and holistic wellness practices, presented by community wellness experts (see page 3).
- Voices of Resiliency: a graphic novel series based on personal experiences of Utahns with substance use disorder. They are stories of hope, stigma, and recovery.

Tough as a Mother launches "Tougher Together" online support group for moms exploring substance use recovery

THE DENVER POST–Tough as a Mother, a public awareness campaign working to humanize and destigmatize the struggle of maternal substance misuse, announced the launch of "Tougher Together," a no-cost online support group for Colorado pregnant and parenting moms interested in exploring and strengthening their recovery journey. Tough as a Mother was created with the goal of connecting moms to treatment and recovery support in their communities and the Tougher Together support group is the campaign's first foray into direct community services.





FEATURED WEBINAR (PART I): UNDERSTANDING FENTANYL

The Mountain Plains Rural Opioid Technical Assistance Center (MP ROTAC) is proud to partner with the Utah State University Extension on the first of two webinars discussing Fentanyl in school settings. Recent data shows illicitly manufactured fentanyl (IMF) is an increasing contributor to the high rates of opioid overdose. Most worrisome is the potential impact on school-aged youth who may not be aware of the risks. This presentation will provide a background on IMF, and discuss signs, symptoms, and consequences of use. Participants will also learn about current trends and the prevalence of substance use amongst youth and discuss the do's and don'ts of addressing and preventing substance misuse among youth by utilizing evidencebased prevention strategies.

PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: WYOMING STATE OPIOID RESPONSE PROGRAM

What do you see as the most important role your program plays in the state?

To spread awareness and information that recovery is possible for folks in Wyoming. There is a lot of stigma surrounding people who use drugs, but that stigma does not have to be a barrier to receive help. No one has to die from the disease of addiction, there are resources available for people to find treatment and recovery services in every county of the state.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Wyoming's State Opioid Response Program is funded by SAMHSA and provides support and resources to individuals with or affected by OUD through efforts of prevention, harm reduction, recovery, and treatment services. For example, in Wyoming there are several practitioners who participate in Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) services, which provide medications such as buprenorphine or suboxone to individuals with OUD. Of importance in Wyoming is to address the opioid crisis across this frontier state, and within disparate populations, including Native Americans and justice involved individuals.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Announces Nearly \$9 Million to Increase the Number of SUD Clinicians in Underserved Communities

HHS–Through HRSA, HHS announced awards of approximately \$9 million to strengthen and expand the mental health and substance use workforce in underserved and rural communities. The funding will provide support to 20 grantees to train health care providers to provide care for individuals in need of mental health and substance use services.

The grant awards total up to \$47.8 million.

Addressing The Opioid Crisis: A Look At The Evolving Landscape Of Federal OUD Treatment Policies

KAISER FAMILY FOUNDATION-Opioid overdose deaths, primarily driven by fentanyl, have surged during the pandemic, exposing significant gaps in access to and availability of treatment. From 2016 to 2021, opioid overdose deaths nearly doubled, from 42,249 to 80,411. By 2021, these deaths accounted for 75% of all fatal drug overdoses, up from 66% in 2016. Rises in overdose deaths have been particularly sharp among people of color and young people. Policy efforts have focused on enhancing access to medications for Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) treatment, which can substantially reduce overdose and mortality rates. Yet, approximately 75% of people with OUD do not receive the recommended treatment, and treatment rates are generally lower among people of color and adolescents.

NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH–Only 1 in 4 residential addiction treatment facilities caring for U.S. adolescents under 18 years old offer buprenorphine, a medication used to treat opioid use disorder, according to a new study (link is external). Only 1 in 8 offer buprenorphine for ongoing treatment. These findings highlight a significant gap in access to evidence-based addiction treatment among



FEATURED WEBINAR (PART I): UNDERSTANDING FENTANYL

The Mountain Plains Rural Opioid Technical Assistance Center (MP ROTAC) hosted the Utah State University (USU) Extension for the first of a two-webinar series discussing Fentanyl in school settings. Participants were provided with information about illicitly manufactured fentanyl (IMF), including current trends and prevalence of substance use amongst youth. Also discussed were the potential impacts of IMF use among schoolaged youth, signs and symptoms of use, and how to respond to an overdose.

WHAT IS IMF?

- A synthetic opioid
- · An analog of pharmaceutical fentanyl
- 50 times more potent than heroin
- · Commonly comes in liquid or powder form
- Can be knowingly or unknowingly consumed as a stand alone substance or mixed with other substances

WHY IS IT DANGEROUS?

- · Small amount (2mg) causes overdose
- · Cannot see, smell, or taste it
- Unknown amount in and across substances
- Analogs do not show up on traditional toxicology screenings
- Tolerance is different for everyone

The suicide rate among American farmers is serious and worsening but may not be well explained by either a lack of access to care or demographic characteristics. This webinar will begin with a brief fact book about suicide and American farming that emphasizes the diversity present in farming and ranching. Discussion topics will include which hypotheses about agricultural suicide are more likely and less likely in the context of the current epidemiological research; where the likely points of leverage are; what is known and not known about the critical protective and risk factors: what is needed to make telehealth successful with this community; the impact of farming stress hotlines; and what the clinical opportunities and challenges are in addressing suicide in the agriculture community.

ASTHO Legal Mapping Center Launches Maps of Harm Reduction Policies to Prevent Overdose

The Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO)—ASTHO today announced the launch of its new legal mapping center aimed at highlighting policies that may prevent overdose and help fight the opioid epidemic. With the overall goal of reducing the nation's overdose rates, the center created maps that visualize the national policy landscape of overdose prevention centers and laws supporting community distribution of naloxone and fentanyl test strips.

New KFF Analysis Examines Rapidly Evolving Federal Policies For Substance Use Disorder Treatment For The Opioid Epidemic

KAISER FAMILY FOUNDATION (KFF)—A new KFF analysis finds that 24 percent more buprenorphine, a medication to treat opioid use disorder, was dispensed in 2022 than in 2019, the year before the pandemic brought a surge of opioid overdose deaths – and a focus on how to expand access and treatment. This upward trend in buprenorphine distribution, already in motion before the pandemic, continued throughout the COVID public health crisis, suggesting continued improvements in access to treatment even as the pandemic raised other barriers to health care.

FDA Approves Second Over-the-Counter Naloxone Nasal Spray Product

U.S. FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION— Today, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved RiVive, 3 milligram (mg) naloxone hydrochloride nasal spray for over-the-counter (OTC), nonprescription use for the emergency treatment of known or suspected opioid overdose. This is the second nonprescription naloxone product the agency has approved, helping increase consumer access to naloxone without a prescription.
