

### SUBJECT MATTER EXPERT SPOTLIGHT IVORY TUBBS, Ph.D.



What do you think is the most significant barrier to overcoming stigma related to opioid and stimulant use disorders?

In my experience, one of the least discussed barriers is fear. People hold fast to their ideals and those ideals shape how we think. When people are committed to a certain way of thinking it becomes the lens with which they view themselves and the world around them. Attempting to change their way of thinking is viewed as a challenge. People don't like to be challenged and any information that conflicts with their beliefs are rejected

Prior to earning his doctorate in psychology, Ivory served in the United States Air Force during Operation Desert Shield in logistics in 1991. Prior to his discharge from the military, Ivory's career in the mental/behavioral health field began in Las Vegas, Nevada as a crisis intervention specialist. Later, he transitioned to the role of child development assistant with Clark County Family Services.

In 1999 he was appointed as the Executive Director of Windsor Village Social Services, an agency working in conjunction with FEMA to provide emergency food, shelter and utility assistance for area residents. In addition to fulfilling his duties as Executive Director, Ivory was also a Senior Public Health Investigator with the City of Houston, Bureau of Epidemiology conducting psycho-social assessments regarding sexual practices and opioid use within the HIV/AIDS community for the CDC. After his simultaneous roles as Executive Director and Senior Public Health Investigator, Ivory began adding to his knowledge base by joining the University of Texas School of Health Sciences, Psychiatric Center working with acute and subacute psychosis patients as well as patients in the forensic psychology unit for the Houston Police Department.

Ivory was also a Psychological Assessor focusing on dual diagnosis patients as well as outpatient therapy to monitor psychotropic drug interactions. Ivory took a hiatus from behavioral health to become an HR Manager in compliance and performance management for Walmart US. Ivory has served on several boards of directors and has done extensive work in the homeless community. He has also held the role of director working with the developmentally delayed population.

UTAH - The Project ECHO program offers education and guidance to rural providers who want to provide a high quality of care to their patients but specialized health care resources are scarce. Project ECHO connects medical practitioners working in remote areas with University of Utah Health specialists on programs that include hepatitis C treatment, pediatrics, burn injuries, substance use treatment, and behavioral health. CASE STUDY: Small Rural Hospital Helps Build 'Bridge' to Addiction Services with New Mobile Clinic




A small rural Massachusetts hospital is breaking down barriers to Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) treatment with an innovative new behavioral health program. Alongside several key community partners, Greenfield-based Baystate Franklin Medical Center recently established its mobile, home-based treatment service for its rural community, located about 100 miles northwest of Boston. Fueled by a \$1 million grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration's Rural Communities Opioid Response Program, the Franklin County and North Quabbin Bridge Clinic aims to help meet patients where they are – be it a recovery center, library, a home or the Salvation Army.
