Connecting Prevention and Education to Protect Native Youth from Opioid Harm

A Webinar Presented By





Across Native communities, the opioid and fentanyl crisis are putting the health and safety of our youth and families at risk. Educators, school staff, and tribal leaders are uniquely positioned to support prevention efforts but many need accessible, culturally relevant information to take action.

This 90-minute virtual training provides critical knowledge about opioid and fentanyl awareness, safe storage and disposal practices, and how schools can be part of the solution. Panelists share real-life examples, culturally grounded strategies, and resources that reflect the values and strengths of Indigenous communities.

Participants will walk away with practical tools, a deeper understanding of the risks facing Native youth, and information on how to access prevention focused support and technical assistance through NIEA.

Together we can protect our students, strengthen our families, and build a safer future for generations to come.



1. Hmuya Mani (Walks with a Roaring), Richard Two Dogs, Oglala Lakota Wakan Iyeska (Interpreter of the Sacred), Porcupine, SD. Mr. Two Dogs has more than fifty years of experience in Lakota traditional healing.



2. Gene Tyon, Oglala Lakota, Executive Director, Oaye Luta Okolakiciye (Moving Forward in a Sacred Way). Mr. Tyon has more than 35 years of experience working with client issues of substance abuse, addiction healing and mental health management.



Oaye Luta Okolakiciye is a Lakota-based nonprofit 501c3 organization located in Rapid City, South Dakota. The program promotes healing by providing a continuum of Lakota culturally based services including substance use prevention, intervention, and recovery education. The focus is on strengthening inherent cultural potential while instilling hope, promoting wellness, and revitalizing cultural identity development in youth, adults, families and communities.
